Helpful ideas for Parent-Teacher Conferences paraphrased from the article Mastering the Parent-Teacher Meeting: Eight Powerful Tips by Nancy Barile, Award-Winning Teacher, M.A.Ed.

Be Proactive - "Finding ways to welcome families and encourage them to become active participants in your classroom. If childcare is a problem, let parents know they can bring young ones to the meeting.

Be Welcoming - Set the right tone for your parent-teacher meeting by shaking hands, stating your name and the subject you teach, and mentioning how happy you are to be teaching their child.

Explain Objectives and Expectations - I like to give parents an overview of the goals for my classes, discuss the expectations I have for my students, and explain any language that a parent might not be familiar with (rubric, scaffolding, readiness, testing acronyms, etc.).

Be Prepared - Review your students' grades and portfolios before the conferences. Jot down notes about each student, anticipate questions or parental concerns, and reread any prior parent communication so you don't miss a beat.

Create an Action Plan - Create an action plan that clearly lays out the specific steps that the teacher, the parent, and the student will need to take in order for the student to be successful.

Use the Good-Bad-Good Sandwich - Highlighting something positive first, then move on to the issue, discuss your action plan for correcting the behavior, and finish up with another positive statement.

Don't Tolerate Abuse - If a parent becomes abusive, simply end the meeting; explain how they can take up the matter with the principal.

Keep Lines of Communication Open - Explain to parents how they can get in touch with you after the meeting and ask the best way to reach them.

Student-Led Conferences

Are you going to be doing Student-Led Conferences? Here are some helpful ideas paraphrased from the article 10 Simple Tips for Making Student-Led Conference Work For You by Differentiated Teaching.

Consider if technology is the right choice. Instead of having students make a PowerPoint presentation for their parents/guardians, have students fill out an organizer that includes grades, goals, strengths and weaknesses.

Make a template to guide your student-led conferences. If you do decide to use computers to create your presentations, be sure to create a template in advance.

Look at non-digital alternatives. A mini-book is another great way to share information with parents during the student-led conference and it makes for a great keepsake.

Practice, Practice, Practice. I always start our practice time by talking about what a good presentation looks like.

Schedule it out. I schedule my student-led conferences open-house style.

Create personalized invitations. I give my students about 20 minutes to design an invitation.

Bring treats to keep the atmosphere light. The parents love to look through the journals or take another classroom tour with their children while they enjoy a snack.

Write a note to each student as a personal touch. I write each student a personalized note about why I enjoyed having them in class and how I am proud of them.

Give options to those who cannot attend. The bonus of this system is if a parent cannot come to school, their child can still share at home!

Spend some time on clean up before the big day. I use this as my chance to send home the portfolios and other work samples I've collected.

Master Agreement "Spotlight"

Sick Days vs Personal Days... What Are These?

All full-time professional employees of the District shall be entitled to an annual sick leave allocation equal to one sick day per month, up to ten sick days per school year. The maximum accumulation for sick days is 127 days for all full-time employees.

New employees will receive one personal day per semester their first year. Used personal days will be paid out after the conclusion of the calendar year at a rate of \$185 per day. Personal leave cannot be requested during the first five student contact days or on days when parent/teacher conferences are scheduled or the last ten contracted days or on days immediately preceding or following a district observed federal or school holiday and/or recess period except for a few reasons.

Coverage vs Overage... What's the Difference?

When a teacher has a coverage, this means a substitute teacher was unable to be at the school for a teacher for that day. Therefore, teachers within the building will need to take turns being the substitute in that classroom throughout the day during their prep time. Loss of plan pay is paid \$50 per hour.

When a teacher has an overage, this means a teacher was unable to be hired for a certain class in the building. Therefore, a teacher within the building will need to volunteer to take on an extra class during their plan time for the semester. Teachers who volunteer to take on an overage for the semester will be compensated \$4,300 per semester.
